INTRODUCTION

All students should keep a copy of this *Schedule of Courses*. Besides the course listings, it contains the current academic calendar and registration procedures. In addition, much of the information in the *Schedule* is helpful for answering questions on various policies and procedures.

The **most current** information is announced in instructions distributed at registration. **Always** be sure to secure a copy of these instructions and read them carefully **before** proceeding through registration.

The requirements and policies of each college and school and of the University are printed in the *1984-85 University of Colorado at Boulder Catalog*. Each student should have a copy of this *Catalog* for course descriptions, as well as for current policies. All students are responsible for knowing and following the provisions set forth in the *Catalog*. Students should refer to a copy of the *Catalog* for their year of entry to find graduation requirements.

Because of the lead time required to publish the *Catalog*, changes in University and/or college or school rules and policies may occur in the interim. It is the student's responsibility to be aware of all such revisions. This can best be accomplished by consulting department advisors, checking department bulletin boards, and reading the *Schedule of Courses* narrative preceding each college/school course listing.

Registration Materials

A. Forms and Supplies You Will Need

1. **Course Request Form**—Request up to 6 courses on this form. If you need another, bring this one to the Information Area.

2. **Deposit Form**—\$100 or \$300 (as applicable) is printed on it, and the lower half of the form must be turned in when you pay your deposit (continuing students only).

3. **Optional Fee Form**—Several optional services are available and may be selected on this form. Required at final check for all students.

4. **Advising Form**—Required at final check for continuing students in the following colleges and schools: AS (except major 199), DP, ED, JR, MU, PH. Secure the form from your advisor or department office.

5. **Receipt**—Complete and have validated by Final Check Clerks.

6. **Pencil (#2 or Mark-Sense)**—Use this on all forms.

7. **Schedule of Courses**—Keep this copy and take it with you to Registration.

8. **CU Photo ID**—A CU-Boulder Photo ID is required of all students. A validation sticker will be provided at Schedule and Bill Pickup each semester.

Be sure to read the registration instructions available at every registration. These instructions contain the **most current** information and deadlines.

B. Understanding the Schedule of Courses

After consulting an academic advisor or reading the advising instructions and reviewing college/school requirements in this publication, you will be ready to select your courses.

The *Schedule of Courses* has a table of contents to help you locate the college or school listing the courses you need. At the top of each page of courses you will find the **abbreviations** for the information supplied:

• **DEPT NO**—The department number is essential for filling out your course requests. **Do NOT confuse this with your major number.**

• **DEPT**—The department name abbreviated to a maximum of 4 spaces.

• **CRS NO**—The course number.

• **CR**—The number of credit hours the course offers: 030 means 3 credit hours, 2-4 indicates that credit is variable and means you must indicate on your Course Request Form whether you want 2, 3, or 4 credit hours.

• **TITLE OF COURSE**—This is often abbreviated also.

• **SEC**—This is the section number and it means the same as the lecture number. When an **L** precedes the number (L004), it indicates a laboratory (lab) and is taken along with the lecture. When an **R** precedes the number (R010), it indicates a recitation (rec) and is taken along with the lecture. Some classes have all three: lecture, lab, and recitation.

• **TIME**—Meeting time of the class.

• **DAYS**—Meeting days of the class (**T** is Tuesday and **TH** is Thursday).

• **BLDG**—The building abbreviation. See the list on the campus map, inside back page of this *Schedule of Courses*.

• **ROOM**—The room number.

• **INSTRUCTOR**—Instructor's name is printed when available.

• **LIMIT**—Approximate class size.

When selecting your courses and filling out your forms, remember the following:

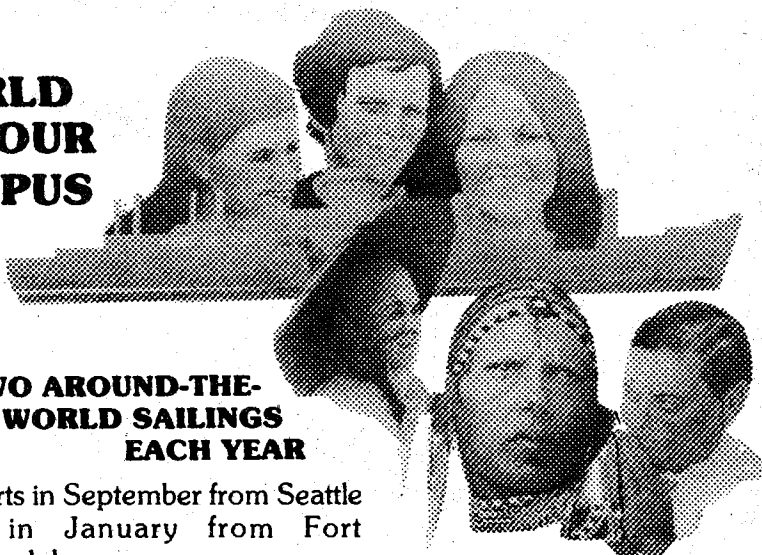
1. **CREDIT HOUR LIMITS**—Until the Drop/Add period begins, students in Arts and Sciences and Journalism are limited to a maximum of 17 credit hours; students in Design and Planning, Education, Music, and Pharmacy are limited to 19 credit hours; and Law students are limited to 16 credit hours.

Business students are limited to a maximum of 17 credit hours per semester. Graduate students may receive only 15 hours of graduate credit toward a degree each Fall and Spring semester. Students in Engineering may take an unlimited number of credit hours.

with their deans for details on maximum number of credit hours allowed.

2. CONTROLLED ENROLLMENT COURSES—For courses so designated in the *Schedule of Courses* with an 800-series section number and the statement "Secure a Controlled Enrollment Form," the student must go to the office of the department offering the course to obtain a Controlled Enrollment Form. Availability of these forms is arranged in each department and will range from a week before registration to the actual days of registration.

The student must complete the Controlled Enrollment Form AND the Course Request Form. BOTH forms must be submitted at registration. A request for a CONTROLLED Enrollment course on the Course Request Form will not be honored unless accompanied by the completed Controlled Enrollment Form.

3. INDEPENDENT STUDIES—Students registering for courses with sections numbered 900 or above (Independent Study, Thesis, Candidate for Degree, etc.) **MUST** obtain an Independent Study/Thesis Approval Form from the department offering the course. The student must complete the Independent Study Form and the Course Request Form. **Both** forms must be submitted at registration in order to receive the Independent Study.

C. Filling Out and Submitting the Forms

USE A #2 OR MARK-SENSE PENCIL

1. **Course Request Form** is the 8½" x 11" form printed in orange.

a. If your student name and number are printed, verify the information. If they aren't printed, use a #2 or MARK-SENSE pencil to enter your student number in the bubbles and the other information on the lines.

b. Enter one course in each course box. In the boxes and the bubbles, enter the department number, course number, credit hours, and section numbers (lecture section number is required; lab and recitation numbers are entered

in the same course box when applicable). Be sure to mark NONCREDIT bubble if you want NC for the course.

c. Be sure to include all zeros (as in section 001).
2. **Deposit Form** does not need to be filled out. If you qualify for a waiver (scholarship, etc.), you must submit this form to someone at the appropriate office, **not** to final check clerks at registration.

3. **Optional Fee Form** is the 8½" x 11" form printed in blue. It must be turned in at registration with student number, name, signature, and optional fees selected. The area for health insurance must be checked with a **yes** or **no** answer.

4. **Controlled Enrollment Form** needs your student number in the boxes and the bubbles and your name printed legibly below the number.

5. **Independent Study Form** must be completed accurately. Section number may be left blank, but all other information including student's name and number, department abbreviation, course number, instructor's name, departmental approval signature, and credit hours must be provided.

D. Faculty/Staff

The following is an outline of procedures. For more information, please pick up a copy of the Faculty/Staff Information Sheet at Regent 125.

1. CATEGORIES

- Special Students (not degree-seeking students) have to reapply every semester.
- Continuing degree-seeking students enrolled Spring Semester 1984 on the Boulder Campus will be set up automatically for Fall.
- Former and Campus-Change Students (not enrolled on the Boulder Campus Spring or Summer Semester) will need to reapply.

2. APPLICATION AND SET-UP PROCEDURES

- All** staff and faculty who wish to enroll for Fall 1984 must take a copy of their PAF and a consent card signed by their supervisor to the Accounts Receivable section of the Bursar's Office. These cards are available at the Bursar's Office, Regent 150.
- Special Students and new degree students must

secure an application (from Regent 125 Information Window), complete it, and take it with the other materials to Accounts Receivable.

3. REGISTRATION PROCEDURES—FALL 1984

a. To take advantage of the free credit hours (6 per year for full-time faculty and staff), you must wait until Tuesday, September 4, to register. Come to Regent 125 after 8:30 a.m. on that day to pick up instructions and your authorization to register. You will then secure *add* forms from the departments and turn in your materials to Accounts Receivable. You must turn in everything by September 21 at the latest.

b. If you will have taken your free credit hours prior to Fall, you may register early and pay appropriate tuition and fees for the course(s).

Priority in classes will be given to those students who complete their registration **correctly and on time**. STUDENTS MUST TURN IN MATERIALS, PAY THEIR DEPOSITS, AND PICK UP THEIR SCHEDULES ON THESE DESIGNATED DATES:

12 FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

1. WHAT IS ROTC?

It's an officer training program designed to develop college men and women for leadership positions as officers in the Active Army, Guard or Reserves. It's integrated with your other studies and is easily compatible therewith.

2. WHY SHOULD I TAKE ROTC?

Lost Schedule—ID Validation Sticker Policies

1. Students who request duplicate copies of their Student Class Schedules, for any reason, will be charged \$1 per copy and must provide identification.
2. Students will be charged \$2 for an ID validation sticker issued after September 21.

Photo ID Schedule

Former returning students, new freshmen, new transfers, and new graduate students MUST have a Photo ID made before they can receive a Fall 1984 validation sticker. All students will need their CLASS SCHEDULES and one other form of ID in order to obtain a University of Colorado Photo ID.

The initial (first time) ID, if obtained during the times indicated below, is free of charge. After September 21, 1984, the charge for an ID will be \$6.

Photo IDs and validation stickers will be issued in Folsom Stadium room 129 (between gates 4 and 5) according to the following schedule to which students MUST adhere. Photo ID hours are from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

DROP/ADD PROCEDURES

Special Note

The **Add** deadline will be in effect unless enrollment levels are reached prior to September 21.

1. Students will be allowed to drop and add through Friday, September 21, with no signature required on the Drop/Add form. The deadline for Business students is September 7.

2. **No Add**, including Independent Study and Thesis, will be allowed after September 21, 1984.

3. After this date, the instructor must sign **Drop** forms. Students must be passing a course at the time it is dropped. A "W" will remain on the transcript for courses dropped at this time.

4. You will be charged for any courses dropped after September 21.

5. Starting Wednesday, November 14, 1984, courses may **not** be dropped unless there are circumstances clearly beyond the student's control (accident, illness, etc.); in addition to the instructor's certification (as in 3 above), students must obtain approval from their academic dean.

6. Validated receipts are provided for all students who turn in Drop/Add forms at the Office of Registrations, Regent 125. It is the students' responsibility to retain this receipt.

7. It is not necessary to secure drop forms if you are withdrawing. Do not drop your only or last class, because an **administrative withdrawal** will be processed with no refund (see #1 *Withdrawal Policy and Refund Schedule* below).

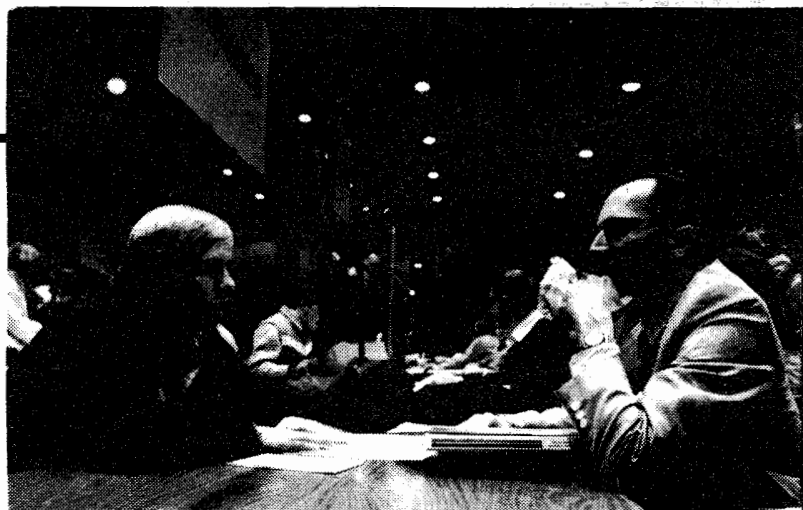
PASS/FAIL OPTION

1. Before enrolling in courses on the Pass/Fail option, students should consult their college and school requirements and restrictions concerning Pass/Fail enrollment to ensure an approved registration. Students may obtain Pass/Fail forms from either the registration final check and ID validation clerks on September 3 or at the Office of Registrations, Regent 125.

Completed Pass/Fail forms must be turned in at the Office of Registrations prior to 4 p.m. on Friday, September 21. Students will be given a validated receipt upon submission of the Pass/Fail form. It is the student's responsibility to retain this receipt. After Friday, September 21, it will not be possible for a student to enroll for Pass/Fail or to reverse the request.

2. The record of Pass/Fail registration is maintained by the Office of Registrations.

3. Academic deans and faculty will not be aware of specific Pass/Fail registrations. For example, all students who are registered on a Pass/Fail basis appear on the regular class roster and a normal letter

When grades are received in the Office of Registrations, those courses requiring a Pass/Fail designation are automatically converted by the grade application system. Grades of D- and above convert to a grade of P. Grades of F would equal a letter grade of F. Grade point average is only affected by an F.

4. Only six hours or two courses (whichever is greater) may be taken Pass/Fail in a given semester.

PLUS/MINUS GRADING

Beginning with SPRING 1984, a change in the Grading System allows colleges and schools, at their discretion, to implement a plus/minus grading system with symbols and points as follows:

A=4.0	C=2.0
A-=3.7	C-=1.7
B+=3.3	D+=1.3
B=3.0	D=1.0
B-=2.7	D-=.7
C+=2.3	F=0.0

For further information, students should check with their dean's office.

WITHDRAWAL POLICY AND REFUND SCHEDULE

1. Failure to withdraw makes you liable for the full amount of tuition and fees assessed for the Fall Semester 1984 (in compliance with the Board of Regents ruling on August 18, 1971).

2. Failure to withdraw will result in a failing grade being recorded for every course you requested and were sectioned into for the Fall Semester 1984.

3. You must withdraw in the Office of Registrations, Regent 125. Before classes start, you may send a letter to the Withdrawal Coordinator, Office of Registrations, University of Colorado, Boulder, Colorado 80309. Refer to refund schedule below.

4. Undergraduate students who fail to pick up their Class Schedules by 4 p.m., Friday, September 21, will automatically be withdrawn from school and assessed their tuition deposit.

5. It is not necessary to secure drop forms if you are withdrawing. Do not drop your only or last class, because an administrative withdrawal will be processed with no refund (see #1 above).

6. It is the responsibility of students to have all optional fees removed at the time of withdrawal. Other-

wise, fees for Student Health Insurance, Coloradan, etc., will become a financial obligation.

If a student withdraws from the Boulder Campus, adjustments or refunds of the total tuition and fees are made as follows:

September 22-October 5	Amount of required deposit (\$100 or \$300) retained OR 40% of full Tuition and Fees assessed, whichever is greater.
October 6-October 19	Amount of required deposit (\$100 or \$300) retained OR 60% of full Tuition and Fees assessed, whichever is greater.
October 20 and thereafter	No refund. 100% of Tuition and Fees due.

**The fee schedule for students taking only one course (1-5 hours) is \$12.15, and for all other students is \$112.80, assessed by the University of Colorado Student Union (UCSU). In addition, students registered for 4 or more hours will pay \$10.00 for women's collegiate athletics (assessed by the Board of Regents).

EXTRA TUITION SURCHARGE: For every credit hour OVER 17 for which a student registers, and retains past September 21, there will be a tuition surcharge.

Tuition and Fee Regulations

The amounts quoted here are from Spring 1984. Fall rates will be announced in Schedule and Bill Pickup Instructions.

1. **Student Responsibility for Payment:** Failure to receive an official University billing will not relieve the student of responsibility for payment by the established date.

2. Students will be assessed tuition for the number of hours for which they are registered on September 21, 1984.

3. **No tuition adjustment will be made for courses dropped after September 21.** However, tuition for classes added will be assessed and billed.

4. Resident and nonresident students enrolled only as "candidate for master's degree" to take a comprehensive examination for a master's degree will pay resident graduate tuition for 3 credit hours and the base fee of \$12.15.

5. **Tuition for a NO CREDIT course is the same as a course taken for credit.**

6. Tuition for a zero (0) credit-hour course is charged at the rate of a one credit-hour class.

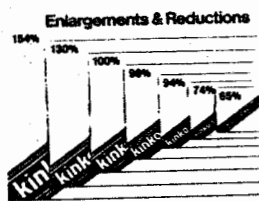
7. ALL STUDENTS taking one course of 5 or fewer hours will be assessed the base fee of \$12.15.

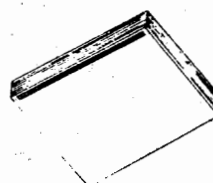

OPEN 7 DAYS A WEEK

These students will receive a NO FEES sticker which entitles them to use no UCSU facilities or services. **FEE REGULATION CHANGE:** This classification will now include the following students: doctoral students taking thesis only, master's candidates for degree, approved doctoral candidates, and 5th year pharmacy. These students will now pay student fees in accordance with the UCSU regulations.

8. Supplemental Health Insurance is available for \$69 per semester. Students electing the health insurance will pay full student fees of \$112.80 regardless of their course load. **EXCEPTION:** Approved doctoral candidates requesting *only* the use of the Wardenburg Student Health Center will pay fees of \$62.05.

9. **STAFF/FACULTY TUITION RATES**—Full-time faculty and staff are entitled to 6 credit hours per year at no charge and **must** register beginning September 4. **FEE REGULATION CHANGE:** No student fees will be charged for those courses in which a student enrolls during late registration (drop/add day). If a student registers early and pays tuition for the course(s), student fees will be charged.

10. **MATRICULATION FEE**—There is a one-time nonrefundable matriculation fee of \$15 for new degree students. This fee will be assessed at the time of initial registration. The matriculation fee covers processing charges for adding or dropping courses or for official transcripts. A Special Student who is admitted to degree status will be assessed a \$15 matriculation fee at the time of the student's first registration after the change has been made.

Deferred Tuition

The option of deferring one-half your total Tuition and Fee Bill until October 19, 1984, is available by completing an application on or before **September 14**. The first half of your bill will still be due by 4 p.m., September 14. Please be aware that the deferred balance will be subject to a 1% per month finance charge. **If you have any doubt** at all about being able to pay your full Tuition and Fee Bill by September 14, please take advantage of this option. To qualify, your total bill at the time of application for deferred tuition must exceed \$100. Please refer to the Schedule and Bill Pickup Instructions for location of deferred tuition applications.

Penalty for Failure to Pay Full Tuition and Fee Bill by Deadline

Except for those students who have made prior arrangements for deferred payment, deadlines will be **strictly enforced**. You will be penalized if you fail to meet the published deadlines, so it is important for you to understand at the outset what those penalties are. **You may:**

1. Be assessed a late payment charge, in addition to the 1% monthly interest on the unpaid balance, according to the following schedule:

2. Be disenrolled from the University and become ineligible for all University services
3. Receive no grades for courses in progress
4. Not be permitted to register for future semesters
5. Receive no transcripts or diplomas
6. Have your account turned over to a collection agency

* DISENROLLMENT POLICY *

Students who fail to meet their entire Tuition and Fee Bill obligations by the published due date and who have not previously made satisfactory financial arrangements with the University will be subject to **IMMEDIATE DISENROLLMENT** from the University and may lose all credit for course work taken during the semester.

In order to be reregistered, students who are disenrolled will be subject to late and service charges as well as a **late registration fee**, charged according to the following schedule:

First working day after the deadline	\$20
Second working day after the deadline	\$25
Third working day and thereafter	\$30

Students who are disenrolled and who fail to be

reregistered remain liable for full payment of all unpaid charges, including any tuition and fees.

Residency Status

Petitions for changing residency status are due in the Office of Records, Regent 125, no later than August 1, 1984. **Note:** This deadline supersedes that printed in the 1984-85 *University of Colorado at Boulder Catalog*.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Academic Integrity

A University's entire intellectual reputation depends on the highest standards of intellectual honesty. The maintenance of those standards is, accordingly, the concern of every student and every faculty member at the University of Colorado.

Breaches of academic honesty include plagiarism, cheating, and the unauthorized acquisition of or disposition of or other trafficking in exams, papers, or other class materials for which the student bears responsibility for originality.

Cheating takes place in different ways, but basically it involves such dishonest behavior as copying from another person or obtaining any form of unauthorized help or assistance from any person or source.

Plagiarism—In all academic areas, it is imperative that work be original or that explicit acknowledgment be given for the use of other persons' ideas or language. For example, the submission of a term paper or other research assignment prepared by a so-called Term Paper or Research Service or Research Assistance Company is clearly a breach of academic integrity. Students should consult with their instructors regarding specific standards or procedures appropriate in each given field.

Breaches of academic honesty will result in disciplinary measures. These can include:

- A failing grade for a particular assignment
- A failing grade for a particular course
- Suspension for various lengths of time from the college or school in which the student is enrolled
- Permanent expulsion from the college or school in which the student is enrolled

Affirmative Action

The University of Colorado, Boulder, is an affirmative action/equal opportunity institution and does not discriminate on basis of race, sex, creed, color, age, national origin, or individual handicap in any aspect of employment, educational programs, activities, or services.

These are administered on a nondiscriminatory basis subject to the provision of Titles VI and VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1973, the Vietnam Era Veteran's Readjustment Act of 1974, and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973. For information about these provisions, discrimination, or equity, consult the Department of Human Resources and Affirmative Action, Armory Building, Room 119, or telephone (303) 492-6706.

Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act

The University of Colorado complies with the provisions of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974. Therefore, certain information is considered "directory information." Such information may be released for publication unless the students inform the Office of Records they do not wish the information released.

"Directory Information" includes: name, address, phone number, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in university activities or sports, dates of attendance at the University, full or part time enrollment status, degrees and awards received, educational institutions attended, and weight and height of athletes.

Students must inform the Office of Records within eleven days of the first day of classes if they wish the personal directory information about them withheld during that semester. Similar notification is required for each subsequent semester.

A complete summary of the University policy on the release of student information is available in the *University of Colorado at Boulder Catalog*, the *Student Handbook*, and the Office of Records, Regent 125, (303) 492-6170.

Final Examination Policy

It is the policy of the University of Colorado, Boulder, to adhere to the final examination schedule as published in the *Schedule of Courses* each semester. While it may be appropriate not to give a final in some cases, such as laboratory courses, seminars, and colloquia, final examinations should be given in all other undergraduate courses.

Exceptions to this policy should be agreed upon by the faculty member and the chairman of the department no later than the beginning of the semester in which an exception is requested. The resulting decision should be announced in writing to students in the class during the first week of classes.

In addition to the principles stated above, the following guidelines should be followed by all faculty members and administrators in order to assure fairness and the best possible educational experience for students:

1. The scheduled final examination period should be considered an important part of the course and used as a final examination period or for additional instruction.

2. The final examination in a course should be given as scheduled and not at other times **even if the faculty member and all students in a course agree to such a change.**

3. The week of classes preceding the scheduled final examination period should be used primarily for continued instruction and may include the introduction of new material. No hourly examinations are to be given during the week preceding final examinations.

4. **Individual students** may be granted a variance from these policies provided the instructor is satisfied that (a) the exception is based on good and sufficient reasons (such as religious observances), and (b) such an exception for an early or late examination will not prejudice the interests of other students in the course.

5. When students have three or more examinations on the same day, they will be entitled to arrange an alternative examination time for the last exam or exams scheduled on that day. Such arrangements must be made no later than the end of the tenth week of the semester (i.e., at the end of the drop period). Students will be expected to provide evidence that they have three or more examinations in order to qualify for exceptions.

6. This policy applies to all undergraduate students, including seniors. Graduating seniors should not be exempted from final examinations. Such exceptions are inappropriate on both procedural and academic grounds.

Intercampus Registration Procedures

Option 1—Boulder Campus students who wish to take course work on another campus of the University of Colorado may be able to register on that campus independent of their home campus registration. However, the student must apply separately and follow the registration procedures established by the other campus. Be sure to check with your dean's office for approval. Arts and Sciences students may not register at UCD or UCCS except in the summer.

Option 2—Boulder Campus students who are unable to obtain courses required for their degree programs on the Boulder Campus may exercise the Concurrent Registration option. Students enrolled for a minimum of one course on the Boulder Campus may be allowed to register for up to two courses or six hours, whichever is greater, on another campus. The course work must be required for their degree programs, they must have their dean's permission, and enrollment levels may not have been reached.

Boulder students exercising this option will pay tuition for their **TOTAL** credit hours at Boulder campus rates. Concurrent Registration forms and instructions are available at the Information Window of the Office of Registrations, Regent 125.

Student Conduct

The Standards of Conduct and the procedures for implementing them have been developed by a committee composed of students, faculty, and staff. In establishing these Standards, we have taken into account your rights as an individual, as well as the general welfare of the University community.

The University would be remiss in its responsibility to you and the community if it ignored behavior which violates the rights of others. It is also essential that everyone shares in the commitment to protect

the integrity and personal safety of each member of the University community.

The intent of these Standards is not for use in incidents involving trivial or minor matters. Rather, they are intended for use in incidents threatening the basic functioning of the University or the personal safety of its members.

As a member of the University community, you are held accountable not only for civil and criminal laws, but University Standards as well. University sanctions can be imposed when policies are violated; the sanctions include, but are not limited to, suspension and permanent expulsion.

Any time you have questions regarding the application of University Standards or feel that another per-

son has subjected you to behavior which interferes in any manner with your rights, public or private, we encourage you to talk with the staff member closest to the situation. Further information is available from the Office of Student Conduct, 492-5601.

Time Out Program (TOP)

The Time Out Program is a planned leave program for University of Colorado at Boulder students who are currently enrolled in good standing in their college or school and whose dean approves their leave for a minimum of one semester or a maximum of one year to pursue academic or nonacademic interests. With prior approval from their dean, students

may take courses at another campus of the University of Colorado or at another college or university while in TOP. (Example: after completing a first semester in December, the student returns to following September or a year later in January.)

TOP will guarantee the students a place in their current college or school and in their current major when they return to classes. Certain restrictions apply, however, for some colleges and schools. TOP participants may register for classes by mail, and application to the University is not necessary. Additional information and TOP applications can be obtained from the Office of Registrations, Regent 12. A nonrefundable \$20 program fee is required at time of application to TOP.

The Academic policies, rules, and regulations of the College and University are printed in the 1984-85 University of Colorado at Boulder, Catalog. All students are responsible for knowing and following the provisions set forth in the catalog. Any questions concerning those provisions are to be directed to the College Office, Old Main 1B-85. The College cannot assume responsibility for problems resulting from a student's failure to follow the policies stated in the catalog or from misadvice given by someone other than a staff member of the College.

ADMINISTRATIVE DROPS

During the drop/add period, students may be administratively dropped for nonattendance in courses in the College of Arts and Sciences.

GRADUATION FROM THE COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES

Any student wishing to graduate from the College of Arts and Sciences at the end of a given semester must notify the Dean's Office, Old Main 1B-85, in the semester preceding. Area Requirements

As a liberal arts college, the College of Arts and Sciences has the responsibility of making available to its students a balance program which will satisfy the legitimate claims of individual interest and aspirations and ensure that those who graduate have pursued a directed, coherent, educational experience.

Candidates for the liberal arts degree are expected to be literate in their own language, to have at least a minimal acquaintance with a language other than their own, and to be familiar with the subject matter and methodology of the three broad areas of learning represented by the humanities, the natural sciences and the social sciences. These expectations generate the college area requirements.

Each student seeking the B.A., the B.F.A., or the B.S. degree in the College of Arts and Sciences must complete two 2-semester course combinations in each of the following areas: Humanities, Natural Science, and Social Science. See the description of the College List on the next page.

In addition to the above, students seeking the B.A. or the B.F.A. degree must demonstrate in one of three ways a third-semester proficiency in a classical or modern foreign language: (a) by completion of a level-III high school foreign language course, (b) by completion of an appropriate third-semester college course, or (c) by a proficiency examination administered by one of our foreign language departments.

THE COLLEGE LIST

The College of Arts and Sciences College List consists of three divisions. Each division represents one of the area requirements: Humanities, Natural Science, Social Science. Within these divisions the courses are listed by departments and then by first- and second-year sequences. Courses joined by a hyphen are considered a sequence. Both courses must be completed in order to fulfill one half of an area requirement. To fulfill the second half of the requirement, students who have successfully completed a first-year sequence in a given department may choose either to take a second-year sequence in the same department or to complete another first-year sequence in a different department listed in the same area requirement division.

ANY QUESTIONS CONCERNING COLLEGE OF BUSINESS POLICIES ARE TO BE DIRECTED TO THE COLLEGE OFFICE. THE COLLEGE CANNOT ASSUME RESPONSIBILITY FOR PROBLEMS RESULTING FROM A STUDENT'S FAILURE TO FOLLOW THE POLICIES STATED IN THE CATALOG OR FROM MISADVICE GIVEN BY SOMEONE OTHER THAN A STAFF MEMBER OF THE COLLEGE OF BUSINESS. COLLEGE POLICIES ARE EXPLAINED ON PAGES 92-102 OF THE 1984-85 UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO AT BOULDER CATALOG.

Administrative Drops - Business faculty may drop students for nonattendance in class or if all prerequisites have not been met. Students are responsible for checking with their instructors concerning attendance policies.

Course Load - Business students may register for a maximum of 17 hours of course work during the Fall or Spring Semesters and a maximum of 6 hours during a 5-week Summer Term.

Drop/Add - Adding business classes is only by petition to the Dean. Business classes may not be added after the first week. All class assignments are on a space available basis. Nonbusiness students will not be sectioned into business classes, but those required to take business classes may be added during the first week of class providing they have received prior approval from their Dean and the College of Business.

Elective Credits - Elective credits should be selected carefully as not all classes are acceptable. Generally, to be acceptable, electives must be taught by regular University of Colorado faculty, must have a form of assessment such as a term paper and/or examinations, and must be regular classroom type classes. Course coverage must be college-level, not repetitious of other work applied toward the degree, must be academic as opposed to vocational/technical, and must be part of regular University offerings.

Specifically, the college will accept:

- A maximum of 6 hours of theory physical education, recreation and dance, and
- A maximum of 12 hours of advance ROTC providing the student is enrolled in the program and completes the total program, and

C. A maximum of 6 hours of approved independent study, experimental studies, choir, band, music lessons, and art lessons.

The college will not accept:

Activity physical education, recreation, workshops, orientations, dance, teaching methods, practicums, certain teacher education classes, credit for internships, and certain classes offered by the Center for Interdisciplinary Studies and Arts and Sciences.

The above examples are not exclusive, but are intended to provide guidelines. The College of Business reserves the right to disallow any credit that is not appropriate academic credit as determined by the college. For further information, contact the Office of Undergraduate Studies.

Incomplete Grades - Incomplete grades are given only in documented and extenuating circumstances clearly beyond the student's control. IF is the only incomplete grade given by the College of Business. The student is expected to complete the requirements, e.g., final exam, term paper, within the established deadline and not retake the entire course.

Information for Graduating Seniors - Prospective graduates must file an Application to Graduate with the Dean's office, and request a senior audit before registering for their last semester. Failure to do so will delay graduation. Also, students desiring to change their area of emphasis after the senior audit has been completed must have the change approved by the graduation supervisor no later than the first week of class of their final semester. Changes after that time will delay graduation.

Intrauniversity Transfer - Students who wish to transfer to Business from another college or school of the University must formally apply at the Dean's Office (Rm. 230) within the October 1 deadline established by the College of Business. Applicants must be enrolled on the Boulder campus at the time of application and have completed a minimum of 15 hours at the University of Colorado prior to applying. A limited number of students are admitted to the College each term by IUT and when the quota is filled, applications will not be accepted until the next term. Admitted students must enroll on the Boulder campus the term admitted or the IUT is void.

No Credit - Due to space limitations, business classes may not be taken on a noncredit or audit basis.

Pass/Fail - A maximum of 16 hours of P/F work may be credited toward a business degree. P/F courses may be used to satisfy only non-business electives. P/F determination must be made within the posted deadline and is irreversible.

Prerequisites - Students registering for courses without having completed appropriate prerequisites or who do not have the appropriate class standing may be administratively dropped from Business classes. Business majors are defined as students officially enrolled in the College of Business and Administration or an official combined program.

Repeating Courses - Repetition of work either at the University of Colorado and/or elsewhere, or below college level work, is not acceptable toward a B.S. degree in Business. Grades of D earned at this institution count toward graduation and courses need not be repeated. The College of Business and Administration does not remove Fs or change grades if a course is repeated. All work attempted will appear on permanent records.

Summer Work - Business students planning to attend another institution during the summer should have their proposed course work approved by a Business advisor prior to leaving campus.

Transfer Credit - Transfer work from other institutions is evaluated first by the University of Colorado, Admissions Processing, but final degree determination is made by the College of Business. Transfer credits from unaccredited institutions will not apply toward the Business degree. On questions of substitution of required courses, comparison of catalog descriptions will be made. Students are responsible for providing course descriptions. Transfer credit for business courses taken at a lower-division level is limited to only such courses as the College offers at that level.

General Information

Statements concerning general policies, rules and regulations, and specific information relative to course sequence and requirements are contained in the College Handbook available in libraries, the College Dean's Office, or the University Bookstore. All students are responsible for familiarizing themselves with this information and should retain a copy in their personal files.

Environmental Design students must specify major code EV 852. Students select advisors from the faculty in Environmental Design. Faculty offices for advisors are in the Environmental Design Building. All students enrolled in the College of Design and Planning are required to see an advisor prior to registration for each semester.

Transfer Students - Before admittance to this program, transfer students from the Boulder Campus or from other universities should have completed a college physics course with lab, English composition or equivalent, mathematics (calculus for prearchitecture, and statistics for planning and other design students), and basic drawing skills, plus an overall 2.75 minimum grade point average.

Minimum Scholastic Standards - Students will be subject to suspension if they do not maintain a cumulative grade point average of 2.00 for the Environmental Design undergraduate division. A "D" in a required course is grounds for repeating the course.

Normal Schedule - The normal semester credit hour load in the College of Design and Planning is 16 semester hours. Advanced approval by the Dean is essential for loads less than 12 hours or more than 19 hours. No incomplete marks (IW or IF) are given in the College of Design and Planning except in the case of a demonstrated medical crisis.

General Information

The requirements and policies of the College and the University are printed in the 1984-85 University of Colorado at Boulder Catalog and the College of Engineering Student Survival Guide. All students should become familiar with these requirements as well as with the specific requirements of their major department. Students should also refer to the front of this Schedule of Courses, which outlines the Standard Grading System, Pass/Fail, Drop/Add, and withdrawal procedures. These instructions provide important information relative to the rules of the College of Engineering and Applied Sciences and is available in the Dean's Office, EC AD 1-1.

NOTE: BECAUSE OF THE REQUIRED LEAD TIME TO PUBLISH THE UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO CATALOG, CHANGES IN UNIVERSITY AND/OR COLLEGE RULES AND POLICIES MAY OCCUR IN THE INTERIM. IT IS THE STUDENT'S RESPONSIBILITY TO BE AWARE OF REVISIONS. THIS CAN BEST BE ACCOMPLISHED BY CONSULTING WITH DEPARTMENTAL ADVISORS, CHECKING DEPARTMENTAL BULLETIN BOARDS, AND READING THE LATEST STUDENT SURVIVAL GUIDE AND THE NARRATIVE PRECEDING EACH SEMESTER'S COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING SCHEDULE OF COURSES LISTING.

FACULTY ADVISORS

Advising is available through departmental offices and administrative offices of the College of Engineering and Applied Science. Each student is assigned a departmental advisor and should check with the department office to verify the advisor's name. Departmental approval is required to assure that courses will apply toward the degree. Transfer students should check with their major department at the time of their first registration for evaluation and acceptance of transfer credits.

General College Policies

- Students who have been on probation or suspension at any time in the past will automatically be suspended if their cumulative GPA again falls below a 2.00. All courses taken at any campus of the University of Colorado are included in the compilation of the cumulative average.
- Students must enroll for a minimum of 12 hours each semester during the regular academic year, or petition for approval to take fewer hours. Students must petition to drop courses that will reduce the total semester credit hour load below 12 hours.
- Students are expected to fulfill all prerequisites. It is important to study the catalog carefully because many courses must be taken in specific sequence. Students who receive Ds in prerequisite courses and wish to register for

the succeeding course must petition to obtain approval of their major department, the instructor of the succeeding course, and the Dean's Office before enrolling for that course.

- The College of Engineering and Applied Science will not remove Fs or any other grade for any courses repeated. A student's cumulative grade point average shall include all academic courses attempted for grades at the University of Colorado.
- Students should note the restrictions on the Pass/Fail option given in the Student Survival Guide and check with their department office for specific departmental restrictions. Pass/Fail forms require the signatures of a designated faculty member of a student's major department plus Dean's approval.
- No course required for graduation can be taken "NC" (no credit). Students must petition if they wish to take a course "NC".
- Students should carefully read the current Drop/Add standard procedures policy in the front of this Schedule of Courses. Students should also keep all Drop/Add receipts until graduation.
- Students are encouraged to check with their instructors to make certain that they are officially listed on the class roster prior to the add deadline. Students will not be allowed to add classes after the add deadline.
- Final examination dates and times are printed in the applicable semester Schedule of Courses. Students should be careful not to sign up for courses that would require three or more finals on the same day.
- Engineering students are subject to disenrollment if they do not comply with the College of Engineering and Applied Science rules and policies.

Information for Graduating Seniors

- Students planning to graduate in December or May should complete a Diploma Application form by October 1, 1984. Forms are available at schedule pickup or in the Dean's Office, EC AD 1-1.
- All graduating seniors should notify their major departments prior to their last semester or session on campus and carefully plan their schedules with their advisor's approval so as to assure fulfillment of all requirements for the degree. Tentative commencement lists will be posted on a bulletin board outside the Dean's Office. The name of each graduating senior should appear on this list. Each senior should verify that the name is spelled correctly and is given as it should appear on the diploma. Each individual's major should also be shown correctly. Please notify the Dean's Office of any errors on this list.
- Final grades for the removal of IFs and/or the completion of correspondence courses must be in the Dean's Office before final exams begin.
- Minimum requirements for a B.S. degree:
 - 128 to 136 hours passed in a curriculum prescribed by the student's academic department.
 - A grade point average of 2.00 for all courses attempted and for all courses that count toward graduation requirements (excluded from grade averaging is the letter grade P in Pass/Fail courses; these courses may, however, count toward graduation.)
 - The last 30 hours must be taken as a degree student in the College of Engineering and Applied Science.
 - Recommendation by the faculty of the student's major department and the faculty of the College of Engineering and Applied Science.

Students may check with the Dean's Office to verify that they will have the total number of hours and grade point average required for graduation. IT IS THE STUDENT'S RESPONSIBILITY TO CHECK WITH THE DEPARTMENTAL ADVISOR ON FULFILLMENT OF THE SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS OF THE MAJOR DEPARTMENT.

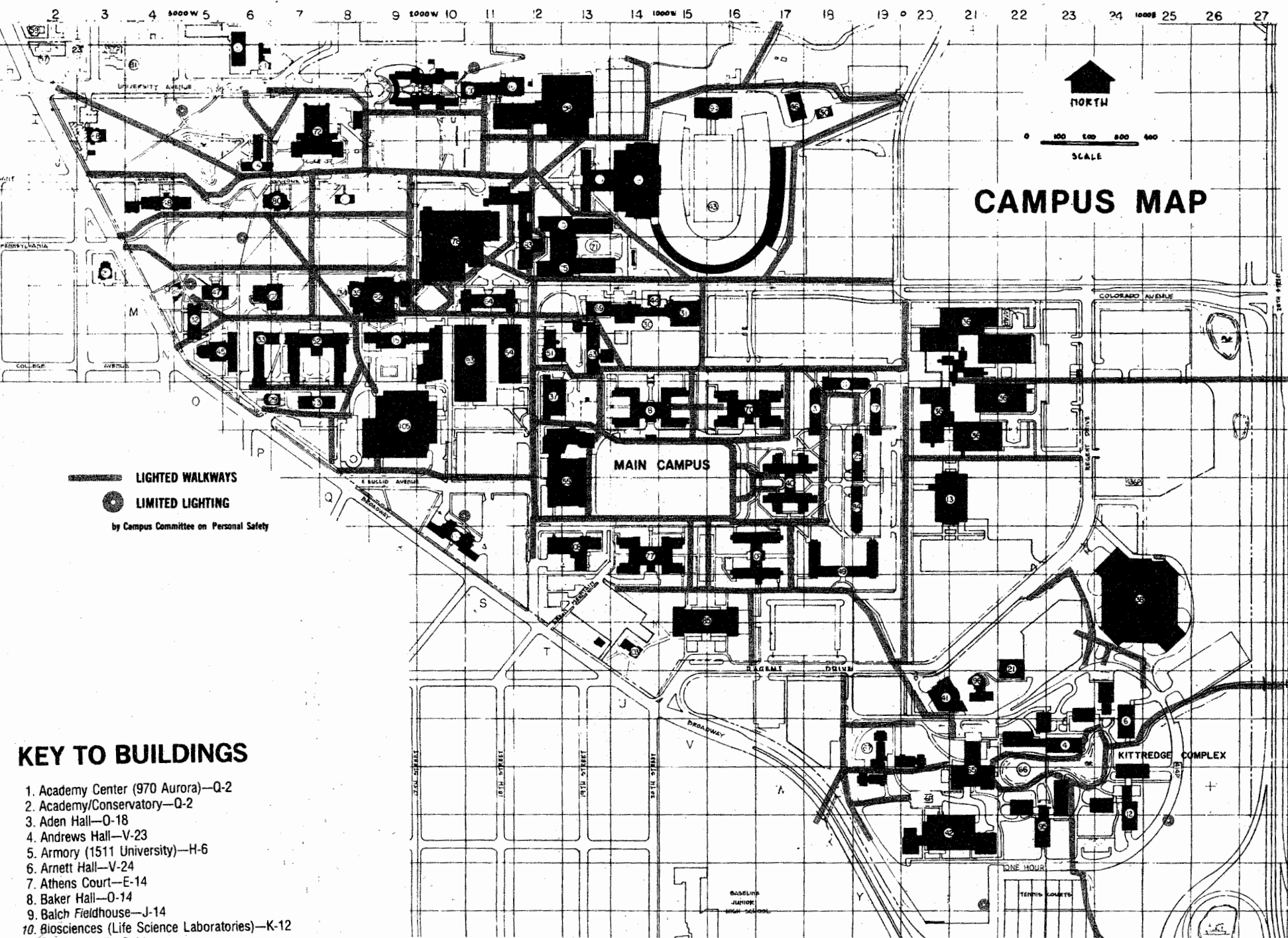

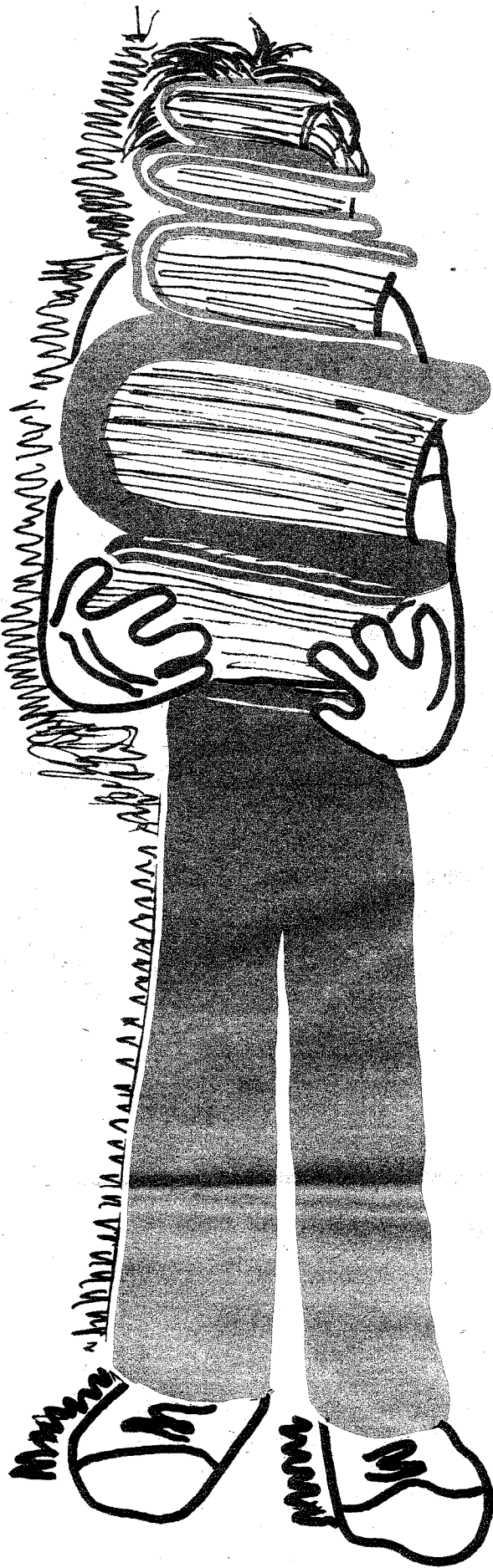
